Since its inception, SWAD provides institutional care for the orphans, aged, leprosy affected persons, prisoners, physically challenged, and through relief and rehabilitation in times of disasters irrespective of their caste, creed, colour and ethnic affiliation.

SWAD seeks to 'walk with the poor' in the eight Southern Districts viz. (1) Ganjam, (2) Gajapati, (3) Rayagada, (4) Koraput, (5) Malkangiri, (6) Nabarangpur, (7) Nuapada and (8) Kalahandi in Odisha. 6. DEVELOPMENTAL INITIATIVE





6.1 Covid -19 Humanitarian Response

The COVID infections have been much serious in this wave than the first one while the other socio-economic issues seem to be secondary. In Odisha, from 5th May, 2021 onwards lockdown and weekend shutdown have been enforced to prevent COVID-19 spread, that has adversely affected the families of migrant workers and daily wage earners struggling with fear, tension and starvation or minimum meager food and water.

SWAD response its humanitarian supports through different possible ways to the most affected families due to COVID-19. As far as the awareness and knowledge on COVID are concerned, SWAD takes the support of frontline service providers and women SHGs for demonstrating the awareness on COVID-19 precautionary measures, symptoms, treatment, vaccination/immunization and the third Covid wave in all villages. SWAD tries to reach to the families of migrant labors and at quarantine centers providing psychosocial counseling to come out of the depression, fear and stigmatization in Gajapati and Ganjam district of Odisha.



Activities and Achievements

- ➤ SWAD provided Rs. 3000.00 to 25 deceased families (bank transfer).
- Provided Rs. 2000.00 to 50 COVID positive patients in the area. (Bank transfer)
- ➤ SWAD also provides relief of 2000 dry food kits to 2000 households (Rice-10 kg, Dal-1 Kg, Oil-1 ltr)
- > Provided 15 medical kits for 15 health-care centers
- Provided 1000 sanitation kits to the 1000 most affected people.



6.2 Covid-19 Relief Response (Dry Ration, Sanitizer, Mask, Soap, Medicine) Support for Dalit and Adivasi Households of Rayagada District, Odisha.

An emotional appeal was made to the people to adhere to COVID-19 protocol, stating that the whole country was going through a crisis and the health care system in major cities were under intense pressure, it was urged everyone to wear masks and maintain social distancing. The state is keeping a close watch on the movement of infected persons. It is quoted as "Every life is precious and we are continuing our efforts to save each life." An alert was added that we need to be prepared to deal with the worst situations, just as we have done while dealing with the natural calamities.

Project Area: Rayagada District

Target population: The project targeted to support few economically and socially backward classes who were unable to attain even their basics needs such as: Daily labors, Widows, Old age men and women, Physically-challenged person, destitute in the Rayagada district to combat the pandemic Covid19. Mainly the focus of the project was to help the poor families who don't even achieve their daily livings.

Objective: To Immediate emergency Relief support to 2806 HHs from Rayagada diocese families will be supported in terms of Dry Ration such as: Rice, Dal, Oil, Dettol Soap and Mask.

Activities and Achievements

Following criteria was followed for the selection of the households.

- Migrant Laborers
- Pregnant women
- Lactating Mothers
- Elderly persons
- Persons with Disabilities (PWD)
- > Single headed households
- > Transgender.

19 RELIEF RESPONSE SUPPORT FOR DALIT AND ADIVASI HOUSEHOLDS OF RAYAGADA DISTRICT, ODISHA

To tackle the situation and contribute towards the safety and comfort of the vulnerable population, SWAD distributed relief material including, food packets with Rice, Dal, Oil, Mask and Soap and beside the relief materials and 7 community health centers were support with Covid-19 medicine Kits to each center and financial support to create awareness in each village to prevent Covid virus and motivate people to take vaccines in the Gudari, Padampur, Chandrapur, Gumuda, Gunupur, Puttasing and Ramanguda Block of Rayagada district.

Objectives:

- Increase the community awareness on the prevention and spread of the COVID-19 diseases in and outside of the all-faith communities
- Ensuring supply of basic additional nutritional Dry food, Covid-19 Medicine Kit, Mask, Globes and Soaps to the 3000 households.

Activities and Achievements

- We provided relief kits to almost 3000 families. (Rice, Dal, Oil, Mask and Dettol Soap)
- ➤ We provided free counselling services to these families.
- > 7 community health centers were supported covid-19 Kit.

6.3 Watershed Approach for Resilient Livelihood for Tribal Communities in Odisha.

In collaboration with the financial and technical support of National Bank for Agriculture & Rural Development (NABARD), Odisha and Catholic Relief Service (CRS), SWAD has been implementing an initiative titled, "Watershed Approach for Resilient Livelihoods of Tribal Communities in Odisha" in 17 interior tribal villages (Adava, Dangeshkhal, Birikote and Antarba Gram Panchayats) of Mohana block in Gajapati district, Odisha, India.

Activities and Achievements

- Regular monthly meetings were conducted by Watershed Development Committees. The
 meeting of WDCs discussed with the eligible households at their respective villages and decided
 to contribute and a total 2,09,045.00 INR is being saved in the bank
- A total 1094 number of individual net planning sheets of FIP NET plan (Bhalipanka-260, Kandhapaniganda-254, Kelhuru-167 and Solaguda-413) finalized along with sketch of various structures of FIP of watershed in 4 watershed area. And all the FIP has approved and work is going on in the four-watershed area.
- With support of CPR 150 farmers of Dumiguda, Narayanpur, Christopur and Punjasargi, Kandhapaniganda, Bachama, Habukapanka and Adapanka were provided provided moong seeds 7 Quintal 20 Kg.
- Vaccination camps for livestock were organized and a total of 2745 animals including 453 cows, 1161 bullock and 382 calves were vaccinated for FMD and 749 goats were vaccinated for PPR.

6.4 Peace Building and Conflict Transformation initiative in Gajapati District of Odisha

SWAD has been implementing the project titled, "Conflict Transformation and Peacebuilding in Gajapati district of Odisha" in collaboration with a Peace implementing network partners consisting of 10 CSOs/NGOs with the financial support of MISEREOR and Mensen met een Missie covering 47169 tribal, dalit, minorities and other vulnerable population directly and 45828 indirectly from 96 villages of 11 Gram Panchayats of 4 blocks in Gajapati district, Odisha. This initiative has been implemented for the different communities in Gajapati district of Odisha to transform their conflicts and coexist in peace and harmony.

Activities and Achievements

- 6.4.1 Communities in 96 villages from 10 Gram Panchayats of Gajapati District are able to develop conflict-sensitive development plans at village level, to implement them and to assess them, in particular their impact on peaceful co-existence.
- women and youth have acquired conflict resolution skills to address and resolve conflicts
- The community people have been identified 1413 conflicts in all 96 villages of 10 Gram Panchayats of 4 Blocks of which 1234 (87.33%) conflicts have been resolved at village level in a non-violent approach by the hard work and involvement of the peace committee and staff.











6.4.2 An enabling environment has been created in 96 villages of 10 GPs in Gajapati District to prevent conflicts from becoming violent

- Children becoming ambassadors of peace by celebrating International Peace Day in the target villages.
- 1117 SHGs and 96 youth clubs have been strengthened during the implementation of the project in 96 villages of Gajapati district. 13818 women and 3633 youth (2113 boys, 1520 girls) from targeted villages have been empowered and acquired conflict resolution skills and resolved various conflicts in their own respective villages.
- 89 children associations have been formed and instructed various peace building techniques and tools to resolve the conflicts in the schools and among children in villages as the torch bearers of peace in the communities.



6.4.3 The Communities in 96 village have initiated inclusive livelihood promotion measures for vulnerable households, which serve as learning spaces for peaceful co-existence.

- The project has identified 1521 households as most vulnerable from 96 villages
- 462 trainings on various inclusive and conflict sensitive livelihood options were conducted in all villages.
- 1106 most vulnerable households implemented inclusive and conflict-sensitive livelihood options continuously.
- The project worked with 425 SHGs from 96 villages who are formed under Odisha Livelihoods Mission Scheme (OLM-NRLM), of which 246 SHGs consisting of approximately 2460 (10 members per SHG) members involved themselves in Income Generation Programme and Collective Livelihood activities.



6.4.4 SWAD network has developed expertise and identified as peace resource in the region









- A Core Team of Peace Experts as Peace Trainers consisting of 12 members headed by a master trainer. These trainers are updated with new skills for their capacity building like Alternative Dispute Resolution. Later 6 project staffs have been capacitated expertise in peace building process.
- Peace training manual developed in regional language (Odia) for training to village level communities and field staff.
- In 96 Villages Peace Development Committee (VPDC) and 10 Gram Panchayat Peace Development Committee (GPDC)s are active in the villages to resolved conflicts with collaboration of project staffs.
- In collaboration with Odisha Peace Network SWAD network celebrated State level Celebration of 'International Day of Peace'



6.4.5 Stories of Change

A SUCCESS STORY OF BIRISINGI VILLAGE, K. SITAPUR, GP

Water is the driving force of all the People of Birisingi

The villagers of Birisingi have identified need based of their community and proposed to have a pond. Last year, people brought the issue before Pali Sabha for resolution and thereby to present the same in Gram Sabha for its approval. The VDPC members played a greater role of getting the plan sanctioned an estimated amount of Rs 1,300,000 for the purpose. The pond digging has been completed and people's need is fulfilled. This pond would be of great help to the villagers in term of bathing and washing. Further, it could be made use of fish farming which may enhance economic condition of people. The villagers thanked to the initiative of VDPC members of the village, especially SWAD team for their constant support. It was like a dream come true with the help/ intervention of SWAD institutions. So, people thankfully acknowledged SWAD staff for their effort/contribution.





6.5 Community Health Promotion in the Diocese of Berhampur, Odisha, Phase-II

The SWAD organization has facilitated to access, through "Community Health Promotion Program in Seven Gram Panchayats of Mohana Block, Gajapati District, Odisha" in 106 villages of 7 Gram Panchayats, government health schemes for the vulnerable communities. This initiative is implemented in the area where there is endemic to malaria, sickle cell anaemia, tuberculosis, skin diseases and other health problems. Seasonal migration to metropolitan cities in search of jobs and practice of unsafe sex has also introduced sexually transmitted diseases i.e. HIV-AIDS/STD among a certain percentage of the people.



Activities and Achievements

6.5.1 106 village communities of the seven Gram Panchayats in Mohana block have functional 'Village Health Committees' and other Community Based Organizations, who manage the health care concerns of their villages

- ❖ In 106 project villages, 98 (92.45%) Village Health Committees (VHCs/VDCs) are formed of which 82 (77.35%) are functional.
- ❖ The project has taken up the efforts for 1013(30.83%) beneficiaries to use the available (3285) toilets
- ❖ 289 pregnant mothers have made use of the ambulance services.
- 1229 women practice herbal medicines.
- ❖ 42 SHG group were cultivating different types of vegetable.



6.5.2. The adolescents in 106 village communities have been sensitized on protection issues and facilitated to remain healthy in both mind and body.

- 190 adolescent youth are linked to Government skills development programmes or training (Nursing, Tailoring, Carpentry & Computer).
- 758 adolescent girls are enrolled and benefited themselves from different Government schemes that of health, nutrition, education and vocational skill training.
- 1427 children got health and hygiene education. Children are more regular to the schools and the parents have understood the value of education



6.5.3. Communities in 106 village of seven Gram Panchayats in Mohana Block have increased their access to nutritious food security entitlements to keep themselves healthy.

The project tries to entitle the beneficiaries with different government schemes that of MGNREGA for cash for work/job, different pensions- National Old Age Pension (NOAP), widow or single mother pension, disability pension, etc

Total 6089 beneficiaries accessed to government schemes

- ☞ NOAP-302.
- ₩ Widow Pension-159,
- Disability Pension-95 and
- others-13034
- 354 (48 pregnant women, 49 nursing mother and 225 children) cases of malnutrition have been identified out of 289 pregnant women, 650 lactating mothers and 2976 children.



6.5.4 The health care facilitators of the project area are given capacity building trainings and they in turn multiply their knowledge and skills to promote a right based approach to community health care in the project communities

➤ The health facilitators and the community mobilizers were given the training on various topics. This has helped them to understand their role as health facilitators in the community. They were also made to understand the various government schemes available in the government sector. They in turn has tried to help the people to avail those schemes for their daily living and as a result their life situation also has improved.





- Monthly review meeting is conducted regularly in each Panchayats. The evaluation of the activities done based on the action plan is discussed and the difficulties, achievements, issues and success of the activities are shared. The action plan for the following month is prepared together.
- ➤ Quarterly review meeting is conducted once in every three months together with the director, Project coordinator and the staff of all the 7 GPs. Sharing from all the GPs are done by the staff.

6.5.5 Success story

I AM ABLE TO EARN

Village: Dimiripankhalo

GP: Badasindhiba of Mohana Block, Gajapati, Odisha.

These three girls were from a remote area of Mohana block from Dimiripankhalo village under Badasindhiba GP. Miss. Mananita Sabar- 10th pass, age-18 yrs. Miss. Sabita Sabar -+2 pass, Age 20 yrs. & Miss. Iyomani Sabar- 8th pass, Age- 19 yrs these girls were from the same village. These girls were interested for their higher education, but due to finance issue their guardians were not able to support. These three belongs poor family. And they were supporting to their families in their household work for their livelihood.



These three girls were identified by the

health staff of Bodosindhiba GP. And they sent to Block office to attend carrier counselling camp, which was organized by Orissa Livelihood Mission (OLM) at Mohana. The Girls were selected for electrician trade and they were sent to Parlekhemundi for the electrical course then they were taken to Bhubaneswar for 18 months training. Now three of them completed their studies and they were placement job. All of them have joined for the work in Bangalore and started earning from Rs. 11000/- per month. It is a great success and the girls feels confident and happy as they started earning the money. Grateful to the staff of SWAD for helping them to get their dreams fulfilled.



7.1 "Empowering Rural Youth of Gajapati District in Odisha through Vocational Skills Training.

Empowering the Dalit and other Marginalized Youth through Vocational Skill Training and Placement in Ganjam District of Odisha.

Activities and Achievements:

- ❖ During last two years,270 adolescent youth who were unemployed have joined SWAD vocational Training Institute and 212 have been successfully completed their training.
- ❖ Out of the total trained candidates, some have purchased tailoring machines and are earning for their livelihoods starting with 5000/- to 9000/- per month.
- ❖ These tailoring trainees can be employment in garment manufacturing unit as cutter, designers, tailor and instructor in educational institutions, in Govt. and public sector.
- ❖ Tailoring trainees are taught 32 items like, Churidar, blouse, skirt, pants, and shirts etc. which are used for daily.
- ❖ Computer trainees are trained on basics of computer like, Microsoft Word, Excel, Power point, browsing internet etc. They can get employed in NGO sector, small retail shop receptionist etc.
- ❖ Through the Spoken English classes students are now able to read & write in English language satisfactorily.
- ❖ Able to understand & answer back to the qualified people they come across.
- Some have taken up the job of receptionist in local hotels & as travel guides.

7.3 Success story

Sunita Rauto, Age: 40 years, studies: class 7th Passed Village: Birikote, Gajapati-Dist, Odisha, India.

Mrs. Sunita Rauto comes from a very poor family. Her husband is a daily wage labour and has two children studying in the Government school. The family used to straggle for their survival due to poor income of the husband. The hardship of the family inspired Mrs. Sunita Rauto to be self-reliance for one self and not only to depend on the income of her husband for the upbringing of the family. When she came to know about the tailoring center at Birikote run by SWAD, she joined for the tailoring. She made up her mind that she would come to the tailoring centre regular after finishing household work and sending the children to the school. She took great interest in cutting and stitching.

She picked up very fast in cutting and stitching. And as soon she was confident enough of herself, she started taking orders from village women, like ladies Blouses, sari petticoats, small frocks etc. and started earning her own pocket money.



Despite carrying out the household work, she was able to complete the entire syllabus, and then she purchased a sewing Machine and put up a shop in her house and stated earning money, presently she earns Rs.8000-9000 per month and saves in the bank and contributes in supports of her family. Mrs.Sunita Rauto is very grateful to SWAD for the facilitating her to learn tailoring which brought change in her family.

8.1 Global Program India: Poverty Reduction and Food Security, Promoting Social Inclusion of Particularly Marginalized Groups and Increasing Resilience to Disasters in High-Risk Areas.

The Global program India has working in the two thematic areas and SWAD Rayagda is a partner organization of these two thematic areas i.e Disaster Risk Reduction (DRR) and Nutrition and Food Security (NFS). The DRR project is implemented in the Ganjam and Khalikote blocks of Ganjam district, Odisha. The DRR project implemented in the 15 revenue villages, which includes another 17 hamlet villages and the project area having total- 5543 households and populated with 21017 (Male – 10598 & Female -10419) as per baseline survey. The project targeted area is situated in the coastal belt of Chilika Lake and Poirashi, Umuri Dharma Saranpur(UDS Pur) GP and Malada GP are situated in the River Bank of Rushikulya. All these communities are exposed to natural disaster such as cyclone and floods and risk prone area of the Ganjam district. Apart of these the Nutrition and Food security program also run in the SWAD Rayagada in

the District. The targeted beneficiaries are, people living outside social security systems and particular attention paid to women, children and persons with disabilities in these communities.

PROJECT OBJECTIVES

The BMZ Global India Programme enhance the Food Security, Promoting Social Inclusion of Particularly Marginalized group and Increasing Resilience to Disasters in High-Risk Areas in Ganjam district of Odisha by 2024.

ACTIVITIES AND ACHIEVEMENTS

- Conducted Participator Disaster Risk Reduction Assessment in the 15 villages
- Conducted 1 farmers training on Govt. schemes and 105 farmers has got Groundnut seed from agriculture dept.
- 200 beneficiaries have got kitchen garden seed from horticulture dept.
- To reduce the Risk of marginalized people in 8 Gram Panchayats are allocated fund for provision of safe drinking water, sanitation, land reforms, PMAY, Alternative livelihood from OLM, Government linkages for increase of social security protection network.

- Completed CC Road Construction in the two villages.
- One AWC center completed construction under the initiatives of staff

- Provided 10 emergency kits to 10 flood prone communities.
- Organized capacity building training programs at community level
- Organized training for staff and PRI members on existing government schemes
- Conducted community mobilization campaign to increase participation in decision making process. And increased 5% participation of the marginalized communities in Gram Sobha.
